Notes from the Executive Director

elcome to this special "Back to School" issue of *HB Notes!* Having just wrapped a successful Summer Session here at Hoff-Barthelson, faculty and staff are now preparing for the 2021-22 academic year, which launches September 9 and will continue to unfold as classes and ensembles in our Early Childhood, K-12 and Adult Divisions host their first sessions from mid-September through mid-October.

Returning to Campus, Restoring In-Person Instruction, and Adding New Programs

I'm pleased to report that we've made careful arrangements to return all our "regular" programming to campus this fall, while at the same time continuing to serve students needing to continue their studies remotely.

This issue of *Notes*, our first since the pandemic, profiles six master teachers joining our extraordinary faculty this fall; highlights exciting new classes, chamber music and piano ensemble opportunities; spotlights the return of all four of our dynamic youth orchestras; reports on important updates to our health and safety protocols; and includes information on our upcoming open houses.

Fall Registration and Financial Aid

If you have not yet registered for Fall 2021, I encourage you to do so at your earliest convenience, as our faculty members' schedules are filling fast.

The **tiered pricing structure** we introduced last year, which ties tuition for our Comprehensive Program to levels of utilization and has proven highly popular, remains in effect. (Our Comprehensive Program is centered on weekly private lessons with frequent performance workshop and recital opportunities, musicianship classes, ensembles, accompaniment, and ongoing assessment of student progress.)

The same is true of our **newly expanded financial aid program**, which now enables families with incomes up to 400% of New York State's Reduced Lunch Eligibility Levels to qualify for aid awards of up to 40% of their total tuition. Celebrating the Success of Our 75th Anniversary Campaign

In late 2018, in conjunction with our 75th Anniversary, the School launched a 15-month strategic planning process that engaged HBMS faculty, students, families, staff, trustees and alumni in charting a course for the next chapter of music education and community impact. The resulting plan, formally adopted in April 2020, is focused on further enhancing the musical, developmental and social benefits that students of all ages garner through their studies here, while ensuring that future generations of students also enjoy the myriad advantages world-class music education provides.

To support the execution of the plan, we launched our 75th Anniversary Campaign in February 2020, seeking support in the following categories:



Access: These funds support our newly broadened financial aid program and tiered pricing structure as well as our community-based programs for underserved youth and older adults.

Advancement: Advancement dollars have already been used to upgrade our HVAC systems to combat COVID-19, purchase equipment and provide technical support and tools needed to deliver music instruction and stream student performances online, and improve our facilities.

The Ruth Alperson Fund for Excellence in Music Education: This board-designated fund supports faculty-led initiatives including performance and community programming, the refinement of existing programs and development of new offerings (such as those described on pages 4 and 5), and professional development opportunities for our faculty.

Despite the many challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, which arrived just a month after launch, I'm delighted to announce that, thanks to the extraordinary generosity of the Hoff-Barthelson community, the 75th Anniversary Campaign raised a total of \$1,173,477 from more than 125 donors. We are deeply grateful to all who gave and look forward to thanking you and celebrating our collective success at a special event we'll be hosting on campus this October 3. Please save the date – details to follow!

Advanced Track Musicianship Program to Launch this Fall

We are pleased to introduce new Advanced Track Musicianship (ATM) classes at the Upper Elementary 3, Junior, and Senior Levels. ATM classes are specially tailored for students with the following profile: a strong musicianship background relative to their age/ grade/experience level; an avid desire to develop a comprehensive understanding of music theory and related aural skills; and a strong commitment to the program. A placement exam, which can be completed at home, prior to the start of the Fall Semester, is required.

Fall 2021 Safety Update

This Fall, given the significant progress made in the battle against COVID-19, the upgrades to our air filtration and purification systems, and the efficacy of the many safety protocols enacted over the past year, the School will return to delivering most of our instructional programs inperson, on campus.

At the same time, because of the rise of the Delta variant, the multi-generational nature of our student population (ranging in age from 9 months to 80+ years), and current projections that students under the age of 12 will not be eligible for vaccination until late this year, we are redoubling our efforts to ensure the safety of everyone in our HBMS community. Among the key precautions that will be in effect for Fall 2021:

- The continuation of our universal mask mandate for all indoor, in-person activities. Specially designed masks and bell covers will be provided to all wind and brass students and voice students will receive singers masks.
- All participants ages 12 and above including faculty, staff, and students in the following "high exhalation activities" must be fully vaccinated (defined as 2 weeks after receiving one's final vaccine dose) prior to attending their first in-person session: woodwind, brass, and voice lessons; Festival Orchestra; Chamber Choir; Sight Singing – High School and Advanced Placement; Flute Club; Wind Ensemble; Advanced Jazz Ensemble; and all adult ensembles and classes. We will be directly in touch with students and families impacted by these safety protocols and appreciate your understanding, cooperation and support as we work to ensure everyone's safety. Requests for medical and religious exemptions will be considered.
- We are leasing additional large and well-ventilated teaching and rehearsal spaces at the Scarsdale Community Baptist Church, just down the road from us, and will be moving a number of classes, lessons, and ensemble rehearsals to this space to decrease campus density during the Fall Semester.
- Students not yet vaccinated or unable to come to campus due to health concerns may request online lessons and elect to participate in online performance workshops and recitals by emailing **registration@hbms.org** or calling 914-723-1169.
- We have installed two "smart classrooms" to enable students unable to come to campus the opportunity to participate in musicianship at the Upper Elementary Level and above remotely.

New Faces at HBMS

off-Barthelson Hoff-Barthelson is pleased to welcome these extraordinary artist-educators to our faculty:

Noted for her "uncommon voice of great beauty," and "exceptionally moving interpretation of all kinds of music," **Kristin Halliday** (voice) is the winner of the Rosa Ponselle vocal competition's Peggy and Yale Gordon Award and the top prize in the Gretchen Hood Vocal Competition. She has performed concerts and recitals internationally including the Altenburg Music Festival. Singers who



study with Kristin have performed on Broadway, at the Kennedy Center, Ford's Theatre, Arena Stage, and Carnegie Hall. Kristin's teaching philosophy is to empower students and lead them to awareness and mastery of their own instrument.

Andrew Marino (guitar, group guitar classes) holds the degree of Doctor of Musical Arts in Guitar Performance from the Peabody Institute of the Johns Hopkins University where he studied with renowned guitarist and pedagogue Julian Gray and taught the Guitar Methods course. Andrew has performed extensively throughout the East Coast and beyond and won prizes in State University's GuitarFest



Competition, SUNY Potsdam's Chamber Music Competition, and the Philadelphia Classical Guitar Competition. Andrew served on the faculty of the International School of Music and Cockeysville Music Education Center in Maryland. He enjoys working with students of all ages.

Maxim Pakhomov, (piano, Suzuki piano) originally from the Far East region of Russia, completed his studies at the Moscow State Conservatory. He has appeared internationally in both solo and chamber music concerts. His credits include performances at Merkin Hall and Zankel Hall where he premiered his arrangement of Stravinsky's **Petrushka** for piano



duo. His performance repertoire includes the piano concerti of Rachmaninoff, Tschaikovsky, Saint-Saëns, Brahms, Beethoven, and Shostakovich. He received his Suzuki training at the School for Strings with Marina Obukovsky.

Anna Rabinova (violin) joined the NY Philharmonic in 1994, and first performed as a soloist with the Orchestra in 2009. She performs nationally and internationally as a soloist, chamber and orchestral musician. She has appeared with numerous European orchestras including the Moscow State Symphony, Halle Philharmonic, Schwerin Philharmonic, and has



been soloist with the Orchestra of St. Luke's, and the American Symphony Orchestra, among others. She has premiered works by John Corigliano and Alfred Schnittke, gives master classes internationally and has long been a student favorite when coaching chamber music and Festival Orchestra sectional rehearsals during annual New York Philharmonic musician residencies at HBMS.

Drew Vandewinckel (saxophone) is an in-demand saxophonist, multiinstrumentalist, composer, and educator who brings his passion to the bandstand and the classroom. After graduating magna cum laude from SUNY Purchase, Drew began a decade-long career performing across the tristate area while teaching private lessons and running successful classroom music programs. Highlights



include performing with the award-winning Ed Palermo Big Band, music directing the JC Hopkins Biggish Band, playing every saxophone chair with Sal "The Voice" Valentinetti, and appearing on America's Got Talent.

Conductor and violist, **Amédée Williams** (viola, violin, Viola Clubs) has performed internationally and was featured on a Young Artist Concert Series presented by the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center. He is the author of *Lillian Fuchs: First Lady of the Viola* and contributed several articles for the new edition of the Grove's Dictionary of Music and Musicians. Amédée has been the



orchestra director at Scarsdale High School since 2007, has taught viola privately for decades, and has long been a member of our Summer Arts Program faculty.

New For Fall! Group Guitar Classes for All Ages

We are pleased to share that the School will offer group classes for students ages 4-adult interested in learning to play the guitar.

First Instrument Class: Guitar Together is the perfect first step for students ages 4-6 who want to learn to play an instrument before beginning private instruction. Class time is divided between learning the basics of guitar technique and activities away from the guitar that develop children's sensitivity to pitch, rhythm, and musical expression. Students play on appropriately sized guitars and participate in an end-of-course, in-class recital. Learn to Play the Guitar provides an opportunity for students who are new to the guitar to develop skills that will grow their enjoyment of music,



knowledge of music theory, and their overall musicianship. Students learn the fundamentals of guitar playing — reading, technique, scale study, harmonic progressions, repertoire, basic accompaniment and ensemble playing. Class sections are offered for grades 2-5 and grades 6-12.

HBMS Orchestras to Resume Full Strength this Fall



Did you know that Hoff-Barthelson is the only community music school in Westchester with a fourtiered orchestral pyramid, serving students from grades 2-12? Each is welcoming new and returning students this fall:

The Young People's Symphonette is a beginning string orchestra for string players in grades 2-5 conducted by Robert Schwartz. Students must be ready to study the last piece in Suzuki Book 1 (or its equivalent) and be able to read the notes on all four strings.

The Chamber Orchestra is an intermediate string orchestra for string players in grades 6-10 conducted by Robert Schwartz.

Led by Joseph Piscitelli, the **Wind Ensemble** is for woodwind, brass and percussion players in grades 6-12. Audition required.

The **Festival Orchestra** is a full symphonic orchestra for high school students at the highest level of technical ability and musical artistry. Under the direction of conductor Jun Nakabayashi, the orchestra performs three concerts annually; two are with guest artists of international stature. Festival Orchestra members also receive coaching from members of the NY Philharmonic. Auditions for clarinet, bassoon, trumpet, timpani, and strings will be held online on September 2.
